This report contains the summarized findings of MCU's analysis of voting in the 1971 session of the Minnesota Senate and House of Representatives. There were scores of bills introduced and acted upon which are of vital interest to all those who continue to aspire to freedom and self government. We selected one or two bills -- those we judged to be especially representative -- for each of several categories. These areas of political action are those, at State level, toward which are currently directed the greatest threats to freedom and moral order. We also tried to select bills which provide a clear split in voting between those in accord with MCU's stated beliefs and those in opposition.

The primary thrust against freedom in the states is aimed at establishing and increasing the powers of administrative units of government, metropolitan and regional, while at the same time eliminating or diminishing powers of local government. This massive and multi-pronged movement is doubly bad in that local control of local affairs is removed, while the powers are transferred to officials who are not elected to the regional offices they hold. Thus, the death of representative, elective government. Several of the bills selected for this report fall in this classification.

A similar trampling on the rights of citizens to have some control over the areas in which they live is inflicted by urban renewal forces and by housing and redevelopment authorities. This is one more manifestation of rule by an appointive elite, and at least one of the bills included is in this category.

The values and morals of Western civilization are under attack on many fronts, particularly in the schools and in the attempts to weaken the family as the primary force in shaping character and attitudes. Several bills of the 1971 session bear on this struggle, and are shown in these ratings.

The general expansion of government at all levels, and the subsequent abasement of individual human freedom and dignity continued at an accelerated rate in 1971, and one bill typifying this category was selected. The reader should remember that the one selected is only one of a virtual explosion of similar bills.

The profligate issuance of state and municipal bonds is the state's, and smaller government unit's, way of deficit spending; the Federal government can print 'money' but they can't. Such bond issuances guarantee tax increases in years to come; their redemption constitutes part of the irreducible segment of government budgets. In the words of the stock brokers who deal in municipal and state bonds, they have "a first lien on all the taxable assets within the governmental unit's jurisdiction." We recognize that bonding is a legitimate way of funding some necessary projects, but it is too frequently used to facilitate reckless spending -- to mortgage the future.

Spending and taxes are listed last. That may seem strange, for most people's direct contact with the iron hand of government comes in the form of the tax collector. Taxes beyond those needed for the legitimate, constitutional functions of government have aptly been called "Legalized Plunder," 'Robbing Peter to Buy Paul's Vote." etc. Everyone is stung by high taxes. And virtually everyone knows they are caused by big spending. But spending and taxes are results of the actions mentioned earlier. Expansion of government functions and intensity is the cause; increased taxes are the effect. Therefore, we list tax bills last.

We have not overlooked the fact that special economic interests are at work in many of the issues above, particularly in the areas of financing and construction of housing, and we give due consideration in our evaluations to them.

It may be said by some that the issues we have selected do not show sufficient concern for "people's needs," that we do not show concern for "human rights," "minority rights," etc. This is patently false, but this report is not the appropriate forum for such refutation. Suffice it to say, our most constant and fundamental concern, our reason for existing as an organization, is our concern for everyone's rights and freedom.

In order to assure that we keep our objectives in mind rather than having them obscured by the pressures of present issues, we have conducted our analysis in light of our stated principles of Individual Freedom; Limited, Constitutional Government; a Free Economy; and Justice and Order. We have not included the national principle of National Security and Sovereignty. The category of "Miscellaneous" is also used.
