This report contains the summarized findings of MCU's analysis of voting in the 1971 session of the Minnesota Senate and House of Representatives. There were scores of bills introduced and acted upon which are of vital interest to all those who continue to aspire to freedom and self government. We selected one or two bills -- those we judged to be especially representative -- for each of several categories. These areas of political action are those, at State level, toward which are currently directed the greatest threats to freedom and moral order. We also tried to select bills which provide a clear split in voting between those in accord with MCU's stated beliefs and those in opposition.

The primary thrust against freedom in the states is aimed at establishing and increasing the powers of administrative units of government, metropolitan and regional, while at the same time eliminating or diminishing powers of local government. This massive and multi-pronged movement is doubly bad in that local control of local affairs is removed, while the powers are transferred to officials who are not elected to the regional offices they hold. Thus, the death of representative, elective government. Several of the bills selected for this report fall in this classification.

A similar trampling on the rights of citizens to have some control over the areas in which they live is inflicted by urban renewal forces and by housing and redevelopment authorities. This is one more manifestation of rule by an appointive elite, and at least one of the bills included is in this category.

The values and morals of Western civilization are under attack on many fronts, particularly in the schools and in the attempts to weaken the family as the primary force in shaping character and attitudes. Several bills of the 1971 session bear on this struggle, and are shown in these ratings.

The general expansion of government at all levels, and the subsequent abasement of individual human freedom and dignity continued at an accelerated rate in 1971, and one bill typifying this category was selected. The reader should remember that the one selected is only one of a virtual explosion of similar bills.

The profligate issuance of state and municipal bonds is the state's, and smaller government unit's, way of deficit spending; the Federal government can print "money" but they can't. Such bond issuances guarantee tax increases in years to come; their redemption constitutes part of the irreducible segment of government budgets. In the words of the stock brokers who deal in municipal and state bonds, they have "a first lien on all the taxable assets within the governmental unit's jurisdiction." We recognize that bonding is a legitimate way of funding some necessary projects, but it is too frequently used to facilitate reckless spending -- to mortgage the future.

Spending and taxes are listed last. That may seem strange, for most people's direct contact with the iron hand of government comes in the form of the tax collector. Taxes beyond those needed for the legitimate, constitutional functions of government have aptly been called "Legalized Plunder," "Robbing Peter to Buy Paul's Vote." etc. Everyone is stung by high taxes. And virtually everyone knows they are caused by big spending. But spending and taxes are results of the actions mentioned earlier. Expansion of government functions and intensity is the cause; increased taxes are the effect. Therefore, we list tax bills last.

We have not overlooked the fact that special economic interests are at work in many of the issues above, particularly in the areas of financing and construction of housing, and we give due consideration in our evaluations to them.

It may be said by some that the issues we have selected do not show sufficient concern for "people's needs," that we do not show concern for "human rights," "minority rights," etc. This is patently false, but this report is not the appropriate forum for such refutation. Suffice it to say, our most constant and fundamental concern, our reason for existing as an organization, is our concern for everyone's rights and freedom.

In order to assure that we keep our objectives in mind rather than having them obscured by the pressures of present issues, we have conducted our analysis in light of our stated principles of Individual Freedom; Limited, Constitutional Government; a Free Economy; and Justice and Order. We have not included the national principle of National Security and Sovereignty. The category of "Miscellaneous" is also used.

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THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

1. SF1024

This law requires the submission of local plans to the Metropolitan Council before their approval by the local government. Counties must submit also. This gives the Metro Council and all the other Regions in the State power to prevent any plan it does not approve from even being considered by the locality. It passed and became law. (An especially bad law. A NO vote gets a +.)

2. SF1523

Requires that a certificate of need be obtained from the comprehensive health planning agency (Metro or other) before a hospital or nursing home can be constructed. It passed and became law. (A NO gets a +.)

3. SF266

This bill as amended abolished all municipal, juvenile, and other lesser courts, as well as justices of the peace. It is effective in all counties except Ramsey, Hennepin and St. Louis. Another example of the destruction of local control of local affairs. It was signed into law. (A NO gets a +.)

4. HF1413

This bill, passed and made law, authorizes county and regional housing and redevelopment authorities, having powers similar to those of municipal HRAs. These powers include confiscation of property and construction without local approval. This bill combines the evils of HRA with those enhancing the expansion of Regional Government. (A NO vote gets a +.)

5. SF1767

This bill, passed and signed into law, empowers HRAs to carry out housing projects. The bill had originally provided for referenda or elections for those affected, but these provisions were stricken from the bill prior to passage. This shows specific intent to disregard local desires and needs. (A NO vote gets a +.)

6. HF134

This bill prohibits commissioners or employees of HRAs, after their employment with the Authority has ceased, to be an agent for anyone other than the Authority in a judicial determination. It also places other restrictions on them. It can be called the "HRA Shut-up Bill." (A NO vote gets a +.)

7. HF2073

This is the bill that provides State funding of local schools and limits the amount localities can provide for schools through property taxes. The vote is on an amendment which would increase the proportion of the total paid by the State to 60 per cent. This would tend to diminish local control of schools. The amendment narrowly failed to pass. (A NO vote again gets a +.)

8. HF167

HRA Referendum Bill. Permitted advisory referendum in a residential urban renewal project. Tended to mitigate arbitrary powers of HRA. Although not sufficient, nevertheless a good bill. The bill passed the House but did not become law. (A YES vote gets a +.)

9. HF122

This bill provides that bond issues in municipalities only may not be resubmitted to the voters within one year after an election has been held on an essentially similar bond issue. This bill, which was passed and signed into law, prevents voters from being bombarded by repetitious votes to force through bonding which does not meet with normal majority approval. (Original House voting is rated. A YES vote gets a +.)

10. SF10 Special Session

This bill, "Metro Area Commercial Industrial Tax Base Sharing," sometimes called the "Fiscal Disparities Bill," became law. It provides that 40 per cent of all increases in commercial-industrial-property taxes go to Metro Council for reallocation. Dangerous increase in the power of this nonrepresentative governing unit, it allows taxation without representation. (A NO vote gets a +.)

11. HF1657

Creates a Minnesota Housing Finance Agency to make and participate in making Federally-insured construction loans for low and moderate income housing. Authorizes issuances of bonds. Allows deficit spending by State and intrudes government into the private economic sphere as a participant. (A NO vote rates a +.)

12. HF747

This bill, passed by the House, but not voted on in the Senate, would have made it a felony for prisoners and parolees to assault an officer or employee of the Department of Corrections. Provides for sentence to be consecutive to that being served. (A YES vote gets a +.)

THE SENATE

1. SF1024

Local plans must be submitted to Metro Council before approval by local government. See House #1. (A NO gets a +.)

2. SF266

Abolished local courts. See House #3. (A NO vote gets a +.)

3. SF10

The "Fiscal Disparities Bill." Gives Metro Council 40 per cent of commercial and industrial tax revenue increases. See House #10. (A NO is a +.)

4. HF167

An amendment to this bill (see House #8) was offered to strengthen powers of local residents. The vote is on this amendment. (A YES rates a +.)

5. HF1413

Authorizes county and regional HRAs. See House #4. (A NO vote is a +.)

6. HF134

The HRA "Shut-up Bill." See House #6. (A NO vote gets a +.)

7. HF130

A bill requiring resident participation and vote on formulation of HRA redevelopment plans. This bill, which passed the Senate near the end of the Special Session, would mitigate, but not eliminate, the arbitrary powers of HRA units. (A YES gets a +.)

8. HF1937

Appropriated money for the State to plan and develop a demonstration project for an advanced form of public transportation. Duplication of Federal programs. Intrusion in economic sphere. Irresponsible spending of taxpayers' money. Expanding government. (A NO gets a +.)

9. HF2073

The "Foundation School Aids Bill." The vote is on the amendment to increase the State proportion to 60 per cent. See House #7. (A NO gets a +.)

10. HF1657

Creates Minnesota Housing Finance Agency. Bond authority. See House #11. (A NO rates a +.)

11. HF189

Created the Minnesota Experimental City Authority, with eleven appointed members, to study and develop plans for an experimental city. No capital improvements can be made on the site selected by the Authority without Authority approval. Expansion of government; intrusion of government into economic sphere; control over individual's property. (Will spend taxpayers' money. A NO vote gets a +.)

12. HF747

A felony to assault a Corrections officer or employee. See House #12. Vote was on referral to committee. Went to committee and thus probably will die. (A NO vote is a +.)

13. SF1361

Authorizes State Zoo. Objection centers on the large bond authorization. (A NO gets a +.)
